Course Description:

The Fundamentals of Creative Writing provides an introduction to the foundations of creative writing in English. It aims at imparting the key concepts of traditional and modern forms of creative writing and shaping the amateur's mind into the professional writer's mind. Thus, the course will provide the basics of creative writing such as fundamental principles and elements of writing, and introduce the traditional and new modes/forms of creative writing to the aspiring and budding writers.

Necessity of the Course:

Certificate course in the fundamentals of creative writing is necessary for the following reasons; firstly, no knowledge is complete without creativity and this course promotes creativity, creative skills, techniques and acumen; secondly, imagination and experiences combined are perceptible only in creative writing; and finally, the art of living can be inculcated through creative writing. It is therefore needed as at least a certificate course in creative writing and serve the need of society.

Objectives:

The prime objectives of this course are:

- To acquaint the learners with ideas related to creative writing including the art, the craft and the basic skills required for a creative writer.
- To help learners to understand the principles of creative writing and the distinction between the literary genres.
- To explain the differences in writing for various literary and social media.
- To hone the creative and critical faculties of learners.
- To enable learners to put into practice the various forms of creative writing that they have studied through the course.
