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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Ponnani's demographic canvas reveals a burgeoning presence of marginalized minorities and the Scheduled Caste population. These socially marginalized individuals denied their rightful access to education and employment. Established in **2014** under the nonprofit **MTM EDUCATIONAL AND CHARITABLE TRUST**, the college, envisioned by a forward-thinking luminary, **Dr. V K Abdul Azeez**, aspires to sculpt adept professionals across diverse domains. This noble endeavor seeks to uplift minority communities, offering a potential remedy to the educational lacunae that have lingered in the region.

The college possesses exceptional physical facilities, fostering an academic environment that promotes the comprehensive development of students. The institution is devoted to assisting socially and economically marginalized communities, particularly the fishing community, and strives to transform underprivileged populations into societies fully equipped to confront the challenges of the contemporary world.

The campus spans 5.499 acres, featuring a built-up area of 6071.273 square meters. It is situated close to the slopes of the Conolly Canal, just 1.3 kilometers from NH 66, easily accessible by road, rail and air transportation amenities. The campus caters to both boys and girls, fostering a vibrant cosmopolitan atmosphere and a serene environment ideal for academic and extracurricular pursuits. As a co-educational institute, it provides **7 undergraduate** programs in arts, science, commerce, and management, recognized by the government of Kerala.

- There are 12 ICT- enabled classrooms and laboratories, equipped with LCD projectors and network connections, promoting the integration of technology into teaching.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	MTM College offers diverse interdisciplinary programs in Computer Science, Computer
	Applications, English, Sociology, Commerce, and Management. The institution is working on a

Strategic Plan to become a center of multidisciplinary education in line with the National Education Policy (NEP). Undergraduate programs follow the Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) for flexibility and a comprehensive curriculum. The college emphasizes value-based education and environmental awareness by integrating relevant modules into its courses. Program completion requires all students to undertake mandatory project work. The college promotes community service through extracurricular activities. The curriculum includes an Open Course for undergraduates, encouraging an interdisciplinary approach. Students also take Ability Enhancement Courses in areas like Environmental Studies, Disaster Management, Human Rights/Intellectual Property Rights, and Gender Studies/Gerontology in the first four semesters. This approach ensures a well-rounded education and prepares students for a holistic understanding of their chosen fields. BSc Computer Science, BBA, and BA Sociology programs embody a new generation in both nature and content. They are carefully designed to meet the evolving needs of various industries. Courses within these programs are tailored to be industry-relevant, ensuring graduates are well-prepared for dynamic demands. The commitment to interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approaches is evident in open courses introduced by all departments during the fifth semester. This integration aligns with the vision of the affiliating university and the college to break traditional academic barriers for a holistic educational experience. In pursuing academic innovation, the college challenges conventional structures through add-on and certificate programs. In response to the IQAC's recommendation, the college's management is proactively introducing new multidisciplinary UG and PG programs. Approvals from the University and State Government are being pursued for these initiatives. This strategic move highlights the institution's commitment to staying at the forefront of educational advancements and meeting evolving needs of students and industries. Aligned with the NEP 2020, the management tasks the IQAC with exploring the feasibility of Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary programs. The affiliated University strategically allows maximum flexibility in choosing elective courses. This

proactive approach reflects the University's commitment to NEP recommendations. The institution actively engages in seminars and conferences on NEP 2020, fostering multifaceted education. Such initiatives demonstrate dedication to staying abreast of educational reforms and enriching the learning environment for students. The institution marked a significant milestone by hosting a One Day Faculty Development Program (FDP) on "Pedagogical Challenges in the Future - NEP 2020" on March 27, 2021. The IQAC organized this FDP, featuring Dr. P.P. Abdul Razak, former dean of social sciences at Calicut University and Member of the Executive Council, Kerala Council for Historical Research. Dr. Razak provided insights into the challenges and opportunities for Higher Educational Institutions in implementing NEP 2020. On May 27, 2023, IQAC organized another Faculty Development Program (FDP) on NEP. Ms. Soudabi, Academic Advisor and CFO at iNurture Education Solutions Pvt. Ltd., served as the resource person. The program included a class on "Education: Past, Present, and Future - Role of Colleges and Faculty."

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

As an affiliated undergraduate college, the institution is ineligible to register for the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC). According to UGC norms, the ABC platform is reserved for selected higher education centers with high rankings. The institution's readiness for ABC implementation depends on guidelines from the affiliating university and the Higher Education Department of Kerala State. Students can utilize academic credits under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) structure. Evaluation standards set by the affiliated university are meticulously followed for both internal and external examinations. The college encourages credit acquisition through online courses like SWAYAM - NPTEL, COURSERA, and Value Added Courses. The institution prioritizes educating stakeholders about the transformative reforms of the New Education Policy 2020. NEP-2020 envisions the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) to facilitate student mobility across Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) for enhanced access, quality, and equity. In the future, the institution plans to become an official member of the National Academic Depository, a government initiative under the Digital India Programme, providing an online

repository for all academic awards. This move supports students in successful study mobility. The institution's programs adhere to a Choice Based Credit System, facilitating the implementation process.

3. Skill development:

The college integrates skill components in both curricular and extra-curricular activities. All students must take at least six common courses focusing on communication skills, covering listening, speaking, reading, and writing (LSRW). Concrete measures have been implemented for skill development to address industry 4.0 challenges. The institution's Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Cell (IEDC) under the Kerala Start-Up Mission, Government of Kerala, has established an innovation ecosystem. The college organizes seminars and workshops on topics such as Artificial Intelligence, Mobile App Development, Python, Cybersecurity, and IoT. Recognizing successful student entrepreneurs, it regularly conducts workshops on Intellectual Property Rights (IPR). The college fosters a secular atmosphere, encouraging interfaith harmony and mutual respect. Value Education classes, integral to the curriculum, promote values such as truth, non-violence, peace, and love. The IT Club serves as a student tech community for developing technological skills. Various clubs, including the Entrepreneur Development Club, Debate Club, Language Club, Arts and Music Club, are proactive in organizing programs to enhance students' skills. Students have developed commercial and service-oriented mobile apps as part of project and internship programs. The college provides internships to instill interaction with employees and gain real-world experience. Bridge courses of varying lengths are offered based on the prerequisites of the students' chosen courses. The institution delivers skilled courses through the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for all its curricula. Individual departments provide skill-enhancement activities such as industry visits, certificate courses, and workshops to enhance employability and encourage self-employment. Building on this experience, the institution plans to expand these courses in the future. Currently, the college offers a variety of skillenhancing certificate courses including Stock Market, Creative Writing, Vedic Mathematics, Travel and

Tourism Management, GST, Spoken English, Social Media Marketing, Tally, Translation, Event Management, Hospitality Management, Communication Skills, Game Theory, Personality Development, Professional Writing, Cloud Computing and Security, Deep Learning, and Life Skill Development.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The college integrates Indian knowledge into both curricular and co-curricular activities, covering topics such as Indian history, culture, literature, heritage, patriotism, nationalism, and aesthetics across core, complementary, and common courses. The BA English program offers a core course on Indian Writing in English, focusing on Indian aesthetics and literature. B.A. Sociology includes courses on Indian heritage and culture, and the college provides exclusive certificate courses on various aspects of the Indian Knowledge System, including a certificate course in Vedic Mathematics. The institution emphasizes imparting Indian values and knowledge to prepare students for future challenges. Additionally, the college celebrates Yoga Day annually, showcasing various asanas to educate students about the benefits of yoga. The institution promotes Indian arts, culture, and tradition through cultural activities, engaging experts to highlight the Indian knowledge system (IKS). It encourages the study of literature, local language, history, art, and culture among students through discussions, debates, field visits, heritage visits, and the commemoration of national days. Individual departments celebrate Reading Week with diverse programs on vernacular literatures. The college also plays a role in preserving agricultural biodiversity by cultivating Raktashali Red rice in two acres, a nearly extinct medicinal variety known since Vedic times for its healing properties. The rice is acclaimed for treating 'Tridoshas' and various ailments, including liver, kidney, and nerve disorders. Through NSS, the college supports natural organic farming practices in an adopted village. The Government of Kerala follows a bilingual approach in all operations, with courses taught in Malayalam and English for better subject comprehension. The college conducts workshops for in-service teachers, focusing on improving linguistic, methodological, and ICT skills to enhance the bilingual teaching and learning

experience. Administrative communications are often conducted in the mother tongue, and field trips are organized for students to explore traditional knowledge. These trips include visits to tribal hamlets in Kerala, where students learn about tribal medicines, traditional healing systems, economic practices, and the resources vital for preserving their ethnicity. The college actively commemorates significant days, historical events, and special occasions to promote knowledge of India's rich heritage. Notable programs include National Constitution Day, International Yoga Day, and World Education Day. The campus celebrates various festivals and special days to preserve Indian heritage, including Mother Tongue Language Day, Rashtrabasha Week, and festivities like 'Onam' and 'Kerala-Piravi'. Students showcase traditional art forms at university-level cultural festivals, and the college's arts festivals offer professional training opportunities. Faculty members contribute to literary works focusing on local art, history, and literature, emphasizing the institution's commitment to cultural awareness and preservation.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The institution offers UG programs based on Outcome-Based Education (OBE) designed by the University of Calicut, aligning with regional and global requirements. The university has implemented OBE with clearly defined Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes, emphasizing cognitive abilities, domainspecific skills, and social responsiveness. The courses aim to cultivate entrepreneurial skills, enabling students to contribute proactively to economic, environmental, and social needs in line with the spirit of the National Education Policy (NEP) for the nation's social well-being. Institution-wide initiatives include conducting Faculty Development Programs (FDPs) and training sessions to equip the teaching community with the importance of OBE and new pedagogical approaches. Faculty members actively engage in various programs that highlight the importance of integrating outcome-based education into the teaching and learning process. The syllabi for all programs comprehensively articulate Course Outcomes (CO), Programme Outcomes (PO), and Programme Specific Outcomes (PSO), accessible to students through the college website. The institution

places a strong emphasis on Outcome-Based Education (OBE) to recognize and develop learners' inherent skills and cognitive levels. Each class starts by stating expected outcomes, and teachers employ direct and indirect methods to assess the level of outcome attainment. PSOs are established based on factors such as preparation, core competence, professionalism, and lifelong learning, aligning with the institute's and department's vision and mission.

6. Distance education/online education:

The college prioritizes the integration of technology in the teaching-learning process, promoting online education and harnessing the potential of technology to enhance the learning experience for both teachers and students. Despite being an affiliated UG college with limited scope for providing distance/online education, the institution encourages faculty and students to enroll in online courses through various platforms. Ready in terms of human and technical resources, the college is prepared to offer courses through Open & Distance Learning (ODL). Several departments and faculty members maintain their own YouTube channels, contributing to Open & Distance Learning initiatives. Amidst the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, the institute swiftly addressed the need for online education by implementing various LMS platforms. This platform facilitates examinations, internal evaluation, and mentoring. The institution boasts essential technology and infrastructure, including projectorequipped classrooms, free internet access, and a learning management system, to effectively support online education delivery. Faculty members generate e-content, uploading it through the LMS. Accessible through the digital library's computers and the Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC), students can easily retrieve digital and library content. To enhance convenience for both students and teachers, the institute invested in GOOGLE Workspace accounts, facilitating Virtual Classrooms, live classes, and academic activities such as assignment submissions. The MTM ODL platform collaborates with prominent online and regular educational entities like Microtec Educational Services and Frontline Academy of Logistics to offer value-added courses. Recognized as an approved examination center for Calicut University's distance education, the college actively engages teachers in the teaching, assessment,

and content preparation processes for distance education. Many faculty members are active participants in the teaching panel of Calicut University and serve as approved Academic Councillors for Sree Narayana Guru Open University.

Yes, the Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) is composed of the Chairman, who is the Principal, along with senior teachers, student representatives, members from local bodies, and representatives from the Parent-Teacher Association. The college has appointed coordinators for effective management, including Ms. Nadiya C (Department of Sociology) as the Students' coordinator, and Mr. Abdul Wasih K K, HOD & Assistant Professor, Department of Sociology and Mr. Asik N P, HOD & Assistant Professor, Department of Management Studies as Coordinating Faculty members. Their commitment is geared toward shaping students into responsible citizens who embody social and ethical values, along with ideals such as integrity, fair play, equality, and justice. The college has initiated various programs in collaboration with the Taluk Office, Ponnani, to strengthen the culture of electoral participation among young and future voters.

3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of

The annual College Union Elections, in accordance with the guidelines outlined in the Lyngdoh Committee Report of 2006, involve students at every stage of the election process, casting them in the role of voters. This engagement serves to instill in students a solid foundation in the principles of democracy, emphasizing the significance of free and fair elections. Workshops conducted as part of this initiative aim to furnish students with the requisite knowledge and skills, empowering them to actively participate in the democratic process and exercise their right to vote. Recognizing the value of democracy, the Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) places emphasis on educating students, enabling them to comprehend electoral policies and procedures. Through these efforts, the ELC plays a crucial role in fostering a more informed and engaged citizenry. During the assessment period, the Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) engaged in several key activities: Observing National Voters' Day (25th January, 2023): Mr. Rajendrakumar K, Vice Principal, addressed the students and administered the Voters' Day Pledge. Ms. Harisha and Ms. Nadiya, students of BA Sociology, provided insights to young voters regarding the integrity of the voting system and various electoral procedures. Voter ID - Aadhaar Card Linking Campaign (22nd November 2022): ELC and NSS conducted a hands-on training session in the college auditorium to facilitate the linking of Voter ID and Aadhaar cards for students above the age of 18. Electoral Awareness Program (22nd December 2022): The ELC organized The Electoral Awareness Program, aiming to impart crucial knowledge about electoral processes and civic duties to students. Mr. Suresh EV, the ELC in charge for Ponnani Taluk, led a session emphasizing the significance of electoral literacy in shaping responsible citizens.

On December 22, 2022, the ELC hosted The Electoral Awareness Program, aiming to provide essential knowledge about electoral processes and civic duties. Mr. Suresh EV, the ELC in-charge for Ponnani Taluk, led a session highlighting the importance of electoral literacy in fostering responsible citizenship. Additionally, the ELC conducted activities such as curriculum-based human rights seminars, college union election campaigns, and seminars on the election procedures of India.

Collaborating with the National Service Scheme (NSS), the ELC organized a handson training session in the college auditorium, facilitating a Voter Registration camp for eligible students and a Voter ID and Aadhaar card linking camp for those already possessing a Voter ID. Another noteworthy initiative by the ELC is the College Union Election Activity, providing students with a practical, experiential learning opportunity within a democratic framework. This activity serves to instill an understanding of the electoral process and emphasizes the importance of active participation. In addition to the College Election Activity, the ELC arranges various events, such as writing competitions, interactive sessions with social reformers, and workshops on electoral procedures. These endeavors offer a platform for students to grasp democratic values and principles, engaging with experts and practitioners in the field of electoral literacy. Recognizing the need to instill a culture of civic responsibility and engagement, the ELC endeavors to foster these values through its diverse activities. By equipping students with the knowledge and skills required to engage in the democratic

process, the ELC significantly contributes to shaping the future of democracy in India. The Department of Sociology has also organized awareness sessions, emphasizing the crucial role of youth in strengthening democracy. The college, in collaboration with the Ponnani Taluk Office and the elected Ward Councilor, Mrs. Raslath Shakkeer, will collectively manage the enrollment process for eligible students in the upcoming years.

Assessing the attainment of outcomes is a critical component in evaluating the effectiveness of an educational program. This process involves the formal definition of Programme Outcomes (PO), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSO), Programme Educational Objectives (PEOS) and Course Outcomes (CO).

It involves employing a deliberate pedagogical strategy, integrating **Bloom's Taxonomy** to define **five Course Outcomes (COs) per course.** This progression spans from foundational knowledge acquisition through deep comprehension and practical application to the pinnacle of **critical analysis, creative synthesis, and advanced evaluation**, fostering a holistic and progressively challenging learning experience for students.

The assessment of these outcomes occurs through both direct and indirect methods.

- 1. Direct Assessment: Direct assessment tools are employed to evaluate the attainment of COs. This involves measuring COs based on the scores obtained by students in both internal and external evaluations. Internal evaluation parameters include internal exams, seminars, assignments, and classroom performance. External evaluation relies on university exam results.
- **2. Indirect Assessment:** Indirect assessment of POs and PSOs is predominantly conducted through **Course Exit Surveys**. These surveys gather **feedback from students**, analyzing the overall progress and proposing corrective measures.

Calculation of PO and PSO Attainment: The overall attainment of POs and PSOs is computed by combining direct and indirect attainment values in the proportion of 80:20, respectively.

CO-PO and CO-PSO Relation Mapping: To understand the relationship between COs and POs/PSOs, a **mapping is conducted**, and scores ranging from **1 to 3** are assigned based on the degree of correlation:

- Acquisition, cataloging and circulation of library resources are carried out through the ILS and there is a user-friendly **Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC)** for searching the books in the library. All the books have been barcoded using the ILS and issue, return and renewal of books are carried out using the barcoded ID cards. The ILS also facilitates the automated Gate Register to manage the entry and exit from the library by the members and to provide the library usage statistics.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

As per the sanction letter for such grants/funds, the income and expenditure statements are initially submitted to an external registered Chartered Accountant. The audit report issued by the auditor with utilization certificate and all necessary ratified accounts is submitted to the concerned, sanctioned authorities.

Audit of funds received

Funds from management undergo regular internal and external audits. All financial transactions require Manager approval. Annually, a director board member, experienced in auditing, reviews management accounts. The report is then externally audited by Chartered Accountant Mr. Amanulla. PTA funds undergo internal audits by a designated team.

Internal Audit and External Audit

The College accountant oversees financial activities, updating payments in software after manual verification. Daily transactions are forwarded to the account section, and monthly reports are submitted in governing body meetings. An infrastructure development budget is prepared and submitted for approval, with a robust auditing mechanism ensuring effective financial resource utilization **Institutional Financial Oversight and Accountability**

The institution maintains a transparent and well-structured system to oversee the effective and efficient utilization of monetary funds obtained from various sources. These sources include student fees, contributions from the management, funds from the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA), contributions from alumni, and support from other agencies. The entire process is subject to both internal and external audits, conducted regularly by qualified auditors under the supervision of the Managing Committee.

Chartered Accountant Oversight:

In adherence to the sanctioned grants or funds, income and expenditure statements are initially submitted to an external registered Chartered Accountant. The auditor issues an audit report and all necessary ratified accounts. This comprehensive documentation is then submitted to the relevant sanctioned authorities for review and approval.

Internal and External Audit Procedures:

The College accountant is responsible for managing the regular receipts and payments across various financial activities of the institution. A petty cash book is maintained to cover recurring small expenses, and all payments are meticulously recorded and manually verified through supporting vouchers. Daily transactions are consolidated, verified by the principal, and submitted to the account section of the management. Monthly financial statements, including Debit, Credit, and Balance, are generated from the software and presented in all governing body meetings.

A budget is prepared for infrastructural development and submitted to the management for approval. The institution has a well-established auditing mechanism to ensure the effective utilization of financial resources.

Internal Audit Components:

The internal audit process involves multiple checks to ensure compliance with policies, laws, and regulations. It includes a comparison of budgeted statements with actual figures, reviewing the means of safeguarding assets, verifying the existence of assets, examining the cash book and bank passbook, and ensuring proper allocation and utilization of funds for various departments and committees. The admission records, scholarship-related documents, and overall efficiency in resource utilization are also scrutinized.

The Context

Realizing the need to help those in need, the Department of Sociology initiated a **food kit distribution programme** with an aim of providing a total of kits of food materials for economically weak families every month. The project is named Kaithang, it is a **free food material kit distribution program** organized by the Department of Sociology, Students Initiative in Palliative care (SIP), in association with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

Practice:

Within a short span of time the college has left lasting imprints on academic and non-academic arenas, which underline its commitment to the society in general and to the neighboring community in particular.

The college is located in a rural area and there are numerous families located around the college neighborhood that face economic crisis and struggle to meet both ends daily. Kaithang's staff and student coordinators identify deserving families through communication with the college and local community. After setting targets, contributions in cash or food kits are collected from students and teachers. Active involvement of both the college and neighborhood communities contributes to the success of Kaithang's initiative.

Fund raising:
